Letter from the President | Daniel T. Dougherty

Dear Friends of Cristo Rey New York High School:

Early in the 2021–2022 school year, a CRNYHS teacher proclaimed it, "The Year of the Great Return." From the beginning of Puente, our summer bridge program for incoming students, in July 2021 to graduation and the last final exam in June 2022, CRNYHS returned to the experiences that define the life of our community. However, too much had changed to simply resume where we had left off when the pandemic began. To fulfill the mission of Cristo Rey, our community sought to see things anew. To serve today's students calls for Re:Generation.

Faculty, staff, and students at CRNYHS espouse a growth mindset. With effective strategies, good habits, and hard work, we generate a greater capacity to overcome challenges. Upon returning to the classroom in person, teachers assessed students' understanding and crafted lessons that met students where they were, accelerated their learning, and prepared them to be successful in college. Counselors identified new stressors facing our students because of the pandemic, and shared effective ways to sustain good mental health. Growing together again on E. 106th

Street radiated energy throughout the school.


"The Great Return" meant regenerating connections with valued partners in the broader community. More students returned to their Corporate Work Study placements as offices established new routines. Members of the junior class envisioned their future while exploring college campuses during spring break. At the Access to Success Dinner, we reunited with treasured friends of Cristo Rey to honor healthcare leaders, including CRNYHS alumni studying and working in the field. We celebrated the accomplishments of the resilient Class of 2022 at Magic in May.

The generation of students attending CRNYHS today faces a unique set of circumstances, but they are not the first Cristo Rey Lions to encounter tough times. CRNYHS alumni inspire the current students by their examples of persistence and fortitude. As our graduates achieve success, the next generation of students see what is possible, and believe. Sometimes, those exemplars come from the same family, as you will see in the pages that follow.

Our alumni contribute to the communities in which they live and work. Venturing forward, they *renew* their commitment to being professionals for others.

In the summer of 2021, after over a year of remote instruction due to the pandemic, Cristo Rey’s in-person summer bridge program for new students, Puente, welcomed a cohort of 92 eager and nervous recent middle school graduates. Alfa Balde was one among them — and he was unsure of what to expect. After so much time outside of an in-person classroom, Alfa found, to his pleasant surprise, that Puente helped to break the ice before high school even officially started. It helped

him feel prepared for both the academic challenges and opportunities that he knew would come in his first year. In the fall, Alfa discovered a new love of books in English class. Matthew Flowers carefully curates his reading lists to engage students — choosing books that relate to their experience while also providing them with a broad overview of different genres. Reflecting on his 9th grade curriculum, Mr. Flowers noted, “Just as first-year high school students

are in the nascency of young adulthood — propelled by dreams and self-discovery in the face of obstacles — so too are the characters students will encounter.”

RE:SET

Students come to Cristo Rey looking forward to a fresh start — a chance to match their potential to the resources and opportunities that will allow them to thrive.

Most CRNYHS students lack the means to afford a quality college-prep education. Many come from under-resourced middle schools that struggle to meet their needs. All of our students have the motivation, ability, and desire to push past any sense of limitation. Cristo Rey’s faculty and staff are dedicated to ensuring that students have the comprehensive toolkit required to take on the world. The CRNYHS community is helping a generation press the reset button on achieving their goals.

Cristo Rey New York High School was ranked #1

among schools in the national Cristo Rey Network in the key performance indicator of College Readiness.



CRNYHS has almost double the percentage of college-ready students as compared to the average across schools in the Network.

College readiness is tracked nationally by the Cristo Rey Network as the percentage of students earning a 3.0+ GPA and one external measure² of college readiness.

For our current juniors and seniors, the starting years of their high school experience were dominated by the pandemic and the isolation that came with it. The school's college guidance team has worked diligently to maximize opportunities for students to gain exposure to new places, people and opportunities — and this extends even into the summer. 60% of the Class of 2023 participated in some kind of on-campus, pre-college experience this past summer at universities including Georgetown, Brown, Fordham,

Syracuse and Wake Forest with opportunities to study psychology, environmental studies, infectious diseases, and architecture. These experiences have proven invaluable in helping students begin to envision themselves on a college campus and are often the deciding factor in student comfort with applying to colleges away from New York City and their families. These opportunities are made possible each year in part through generous support from Gerstner Philanthropies.

Alumnus Dishawn Carcamo first heard about “The School that Works” when he was only 12. “I started to dream about that beautiful idea,” he says, “the idea of going to school while learning what it’s like to have a career.” Now, six years after graduating from CRNYHS, Dishawn leads the Corporate Work Study Program Client Relationship Team, providing operational support to its largest partners.

Even before he was old enough to attend high school, Dishawn

had big goals — his experience at CRNYHS helped put them within his reach. The oldest child in a large family, Dishawn was the first member of his family to attend college. He studied Criminal Justice at Wheeling Jesuit University and after college graduation, he began a brief career in politics. But in 2021 when he learned of an opportunity to return to Cristo Rey, he felt a strong tug to give back to the community of students, educators, and Corporate Work Study Program partners that

supported him when he was a young student with a dream.

He uses his personal experience to help students understand that “they must navigate and surmount difficult situations as part of life in order to look back from the top in the future.”

RE:CONNECT

Our Corporate Work Study Program (CWSP) began as a unique way to fund our school and grew to redefine who could have access to a quality high school education. As the pandemic redefined how corporations do work, we have innovated in turn to keep this successful model viable and accessible for our students.

Leveraging a Proven Model

A bridge to a high quality education

The average annual income for our students’ households is approximately \$30,000, while the average cost to educate a student is \$20,000. CWSP provides an opportunity for students who have the desire but lack the means.

Each student’s earnings from CWSP cover 40% of the costs of their education.

Mutually beneficial real work

Motivated student workers learn to navigate the workplace as they perform entry-level responsibilities. Corporations across the NYC area benefit from thousands of hours of real work as they make a meaningful investment in the city’s youth.

In 2021–2022, CWSP employers rated our students’ job performance an average of 4 on a 1-to-5 scale, demonstrating that they exceeded expectations.

Strengthening Our Partnerships

Responsive to the new structure of day-to-day work post-pandemic, we are innovating with partnerships that reflect today’s needs.

Embracing the old and the new

With most CWSP partners’ offices closed or hybrid during the pandemic, we developed a program format mixing remote work and group-based mentoring to remain engaged. As the world of work has now shifted – perhaps permanently – we support a compelling mix of on-site and hybrid opportunities, and greater scheduling flexibility to give old and new partners options while preserving the in-person interactions that students crave.

Providing work-ready student teams

Our students go to work for our partners, whether in-person or remotely, prepared to be an asset and grow. Even before the official start of high school, students attend a summer business boot camp called Puente (Spanish for bridge) to build a range of soft and hard skills. We added Microsoft Excel certification to the professional development curriculum and are in the process of creating certification training for Word and PowerPoint.

Engaging widely with firms

A resurgence of interest in “paying it forward” led some partners to express a desire for broader participation options for their employees. In response, in addition to the traditional role of work supervisor, we created a 1:1 virtual mentoring program (called Professionals for Others), offered school-based volunteer opportunities, and worked with partners interested in offering onsite “exposure” experiences to larger groups of students.

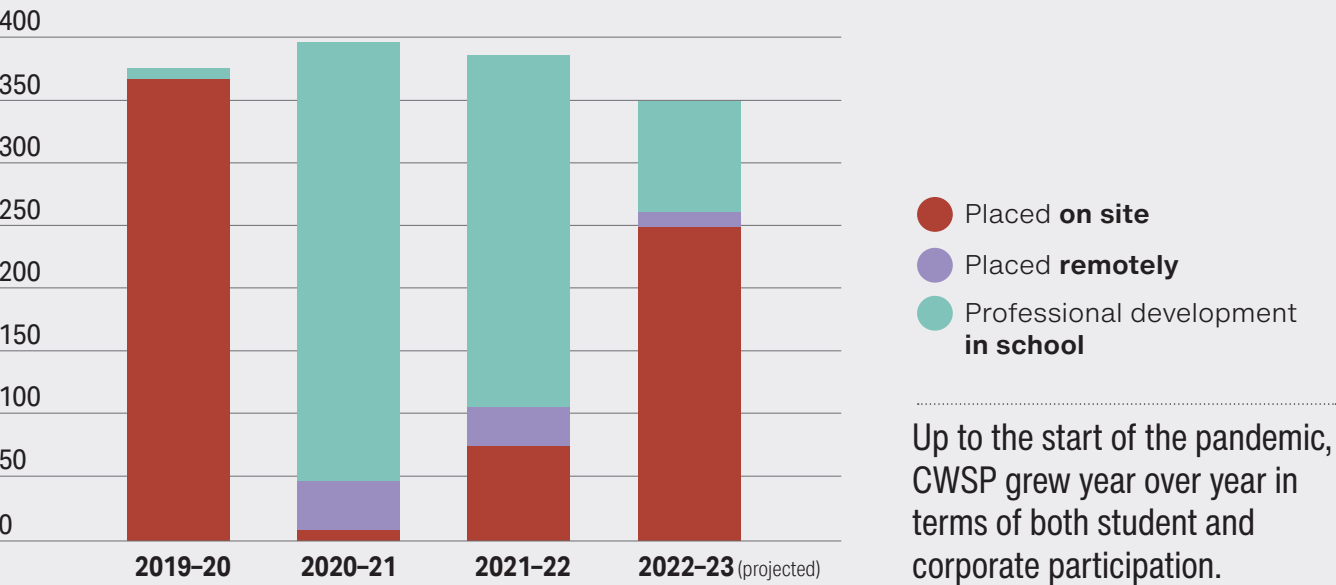
Focusing on teamwork

We continuously work to simplify partnership by providing comprehensive human resources support. A key component of this support comes through our Client Relationship Associates (CRA). Every partner is assigned a CRA who acts as part logistics point-person and part professional development coach to our students. Open communication between partners, students, and the CRAs ensures that the partnership is thriving for everyone involved.

Getting Back to the Office

The pandemic presented a challenge to the office work and culture that are fundamental to the CWSP model, but with the aid of our supporters, we are getting back on track.

Alumna Rayne Peralta credits CRNYHS’s challenging curriculum, supportive community, and instructive Corporate Work Study Program for helping her establish the strong foundation on which she will build her “whole life ahead.” The experiences she had inside and outside the classroom were invaluable.

In 9th grade, while working at Morrison Foerster, a top-rated multinational law firm recognized for its commitment to Diversity, Equity, and

Inclusion, Rayne found her voice and her vocation. She observed, “I learned how to communicate better with adults — to take a stand and make myself heard.” She also started to imagine herself as a successful lawyer.

Today Rayne is an Environmental Studies major at Boston College and has brought her voice to campus as a leader. She is active in extracurricular organizations that celebrate and promote diversity as well as those that

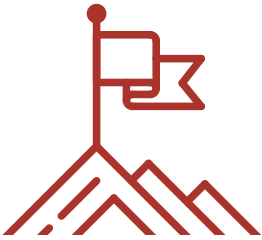

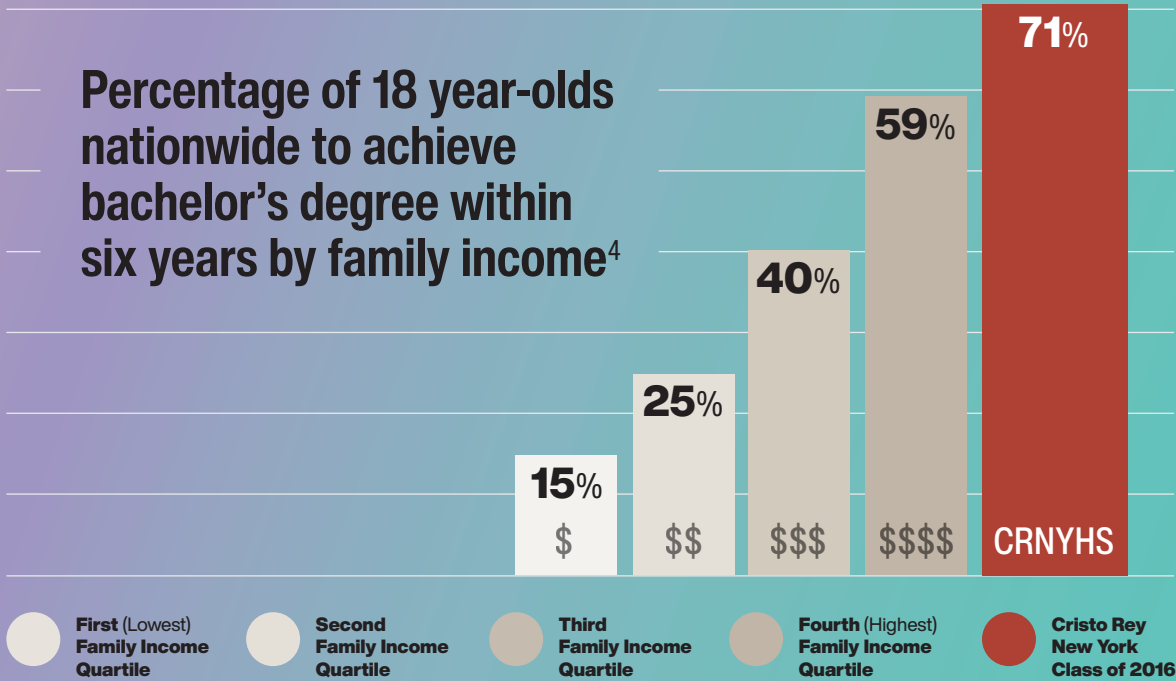

Graduate Support Program

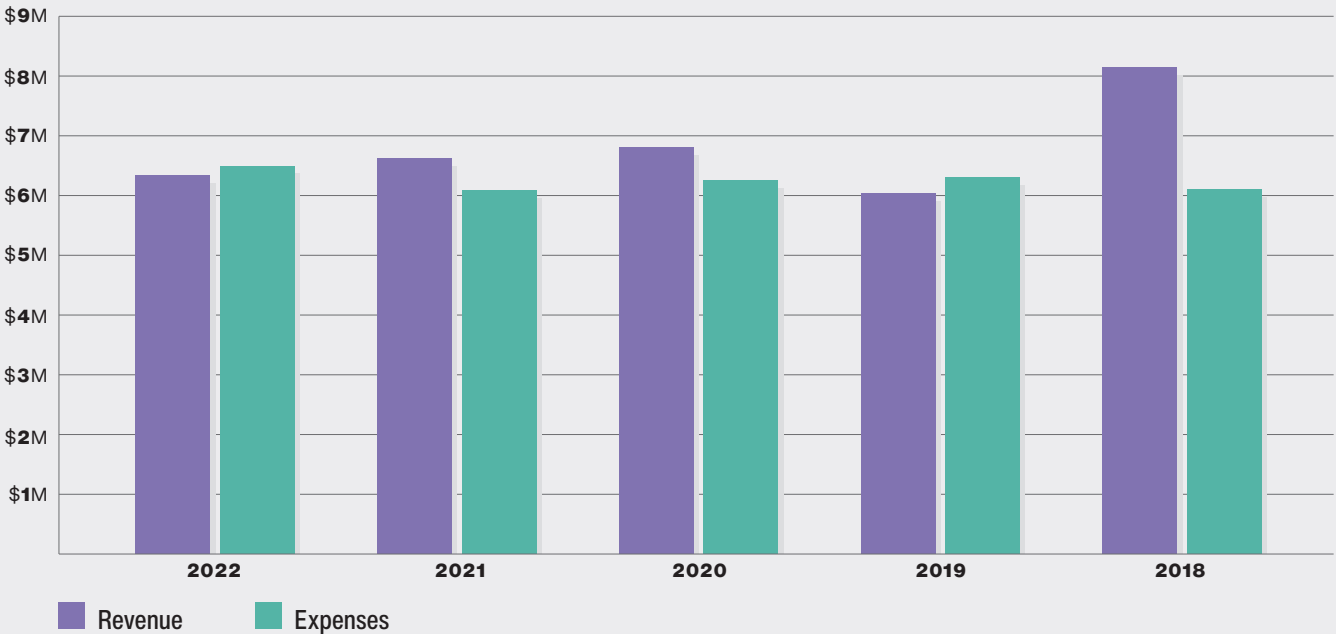

FY2022 FINANCIALS



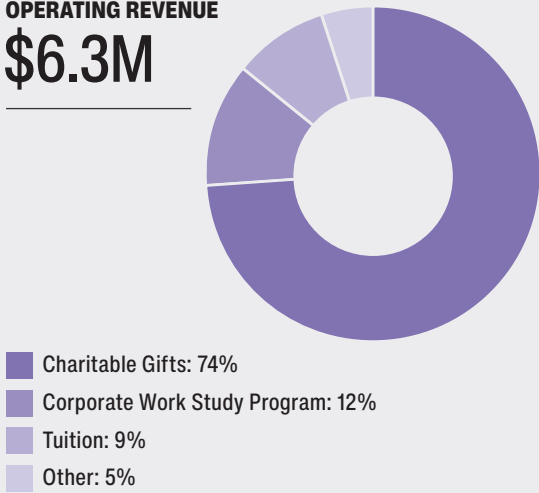

Five-Year Financial Analysis

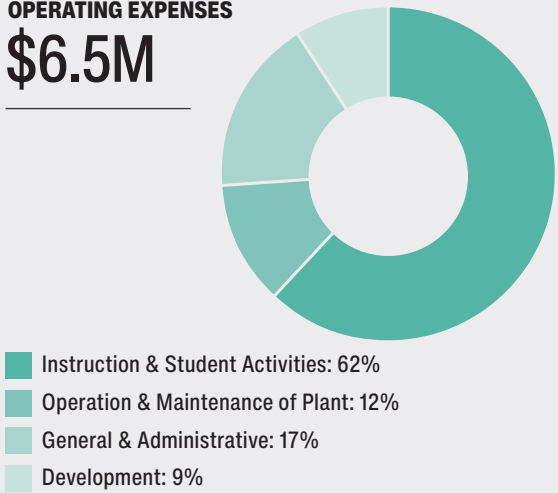


FY2022 Revenue & Expenses Highlights Year ending June 30, 2022

Notes: In FY22, there was an operational shortfall, in large part driven by a drop in revenue from the Corporate Work Study Program during the height of the pandemic. This shortfall was covered by reserves generated during the prior year's Resilience Fund campaign and one-time federal PPP loans received for COVID-19 relief. In FY18, CRNYHS held a Legacy Dinner in celebration of Founding President Fr. Joseph P. Parkes, SJ's retirement. Funds raised at the Legacy Dinner contributed to the significant increase in revenue.

“When I enrolled at Cristo Rey it was the first time I had teachers that cared so deeply — the level of commitment from everyone helped me tremendously.”

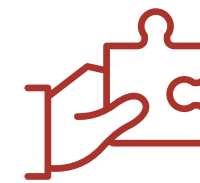
